

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS:

WHAT TO DO IF IMMIGRATION OR THE POLICE COME TO YOUR DOOR



DO NOT OPEN THE DOOR

Don't open the door and tell your children not to open the door. Immigration and the police can't come into your home without a warrant signed by a judge.



REMAIN SILENT

You have the right to remain silent. Immigration can use anything you say against you.



STAY CALM AND DO NOT RUN

Use your phone to take photos and notes about the raid, but stay calm and do not run.



ASK TO SPEAK TO YOUR ATTORNEY AND DO NOT SIGN ANYTHING

Don't sign forms you don't understand. A lawyer who knows deportation defense may be able to help you fight your case.

Naturalization:

You are eligible if....

- 1) You are at least 18 years old and have been a permanent resident for at least 5 years
- 2) You are at least 18 years old and have been a permanent resident for at least 3 years AND are married to a US Citizen
- 3) You are in the US Armed forces and have served at least one year

DACA-DAPA:

You are eligible if....

- 1) Arrived in the US before you were 16 years old
- 2) Have lived in the US since June 15, 2007
- 3) You were physically present in the US since June 15, 2012
- 4) You are in school, have graduated/GED, or if you are a veteran
- 5) Do not have a criminal record

GREEN CARD/Resident Card:

You may be eligible to apply for a green card through your family, a job offer or employment, refugee or asylum status, or a number of other special provisions. Relatives of a U.S. citizen who are given the highest immigration priority. Parents of a U.S. citizen, Spouses of a U.S. citizen, Unmarried children under age 21 of a U.S. citizen

**ALL CHILDREN,
regardless of
immigration status,
are eligible for
Medi-Cal coverage.**

Health coverage and care are an important part of making sure children and youth succeed in school and life. As of May 16, 2016, health coverage through Medi-Cal is available to all undocumented children under 19 years old, whose families meet the income requirements. For example, all children in a family of four that has a monthly income of \$5,387 will qualify for coverage.



**Apply
any time of
the year**

You can enroll in Medi-Cal any time of the year. You can apply over the phone, through a mail-in application, or in person at your local county human services office or local clinic. Get help finding a clinic at www.localclinic.net or by calling (855) 899-7587.



**Bring what
you need**

When you apply for Medi-Cal, bring as many of the following items as you can:

- ▶ **Proof of Identity** (any passport or photo ID)
- ▶ **Proof of Income** (current pay stub or bank statement)
- ▶ **Proof of Residency** (telephone or electric bill)
- ▶ **Medi-Cal cards of other family members**, if applicable

* Not all items are needed to enroll.



**Coverage and
care are free
or low cost**

Medi-Cal is free for children whose household meets certain income requirements. Other families, depending on their income, may have a small monthly fee. For all children, Medi-Cal coverage opens the door to free preventive care and treatment, including medical, vision, dental, and mental health services. Getting regular preventive care, like checkups and screenings, makes it possible to identify and treat health problems before they become more serious conditions.

IMMIGRANT FAMILIES

can enroll their children in Medi-Cal without worrying how personal information, including their immigration status, will be shared. Personal information is safe and protected and will NOT be shared with immigration officials or used for immigration enforcement purposes. Medi-Cal will only use personal information to check eligibility status for health coverage.
